The Chennai floods of 2015

urgent need for ethical disaster management guidelines

Further to the recent floods that inundated Chennai in 2015; this article published in the Indian Journal of Medical Ethics draws on lessons learnt from the lack of equity in relief and response and poor communication between the government and non-government rescue operations. The article also draws attention to the large focus to the neglect of rehabilitation and reconstruction efforts following the floods. It calls for an urgent need to develop ethical guidelines for disaster management and response. Chennai, the capital city of Tamil Nadu, was particularly hard hit by these floods. This flood, which is said to be the worst in about a century, resulted in a massive displacement of close to 18 lakh people in the city. The damages and losses have been estimated between Rs 50,000 and Rs100,000 crore.
